Irwin Rodman is an industrial psychologist. In a nutshell, he helps companies and people find out what kind of a slot they fit in and/or what kind of slot they have available. Rodman's book, The Executive Jungle, deals with some of the various types of people he found in over twenty years of experience. (Hence the title.)

There are twenty-four or so chapters grouped into four sections. The entire book is well-written, with the first ll chapters being a shining example of fine craftsmanship.

ACLU AND THE LIBERTARIAN

One of the best and largest "Civil Libertarian" organization is the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU). The only trouble is, the ACLU is very weak on economic liberty. However, since they are excellent on personal liberty, it should not be too hard to turn the ACLU towards a more pure form of libertarianism.

A number of libertarians, including a number of SLL members, are activily working in the ACLU to lead it towards a more libertarian postion. However, change should be taken slowly. Libertarians should join the ACLU and work up to positions of leadership.

If change comes too fast, a backlash effect might occur. This is exactly the present situation with the Peace and Freedom Party. Libertarians moved too fast, capturing the leadership one year, and then to lose it the next.

This is not a deceptive approach. Every organization has its factions. Back in the 1960's, libertarians tried to have their voices heard in the conservative youth or ganization Young Americans for Freedom (YAF). The libertarian faction lost a bid for strong leadership in YAF in 1969, however, the libertarian faction has been strong in YAF ever since. There has been at least two nation-wide purges of libertarians in YAF, yet libertarians continue to pop-up in high leadership positions.

Hopefully, the ACLU will welcome an influx of libertarians into its ranks.
