# **Census Resistance 1980**

The movement to resist the involuntary Census of 1980 is beginning to grow. Society for Individual Liberty (SIL), under the leadership of Don Ernsberger and Dave Walter, will spearhead the anti-census revolt. Society for Libertarian Life will participate in this program and urge individuals to mail SLL or SIL the offical census form from the government.

It was the revolt against the 1970 census which is marked as the first nation-wide libertarian protest. In 1970, more than 3,000 person defied the state and mail their official census form to a number of nation-wide libertarian organizations. In 1980, libertarians are hoping for over 1 million. More details will be given in the next issue.

### **Anti-Draft Forces Win**

At least for this session of Congress, the draft registration measure lost. Congress voted 259 to 155 in favor of taking draft registration out of the weapons bill.

# Englishman Gives Lec. On G.B. Soc. Medicine



# DR. BRANDEN'S LECTURE AT CSUF

Dr. Nathaniel Branden, a former close associate of the novelist Ayn Rand, will give a lecture at Cal State University, Fullerton on October 26 in the Muti-Purpose room at 7:30 pm. [see map on page two]. Branden's topic is "Why Do Relationships Succeed or Fail?" which is a subject that is discussed in Branden's up-coming new book.


Branden's topic is timely for libertarians and non-libertarians alike. As most libertarians should know, one cannot be free if they have psychological hang-ups in regards to personal relationships with friends, workers, employers and lovers. It is important to remember that the libertarian movement cannot succeed if the persons who call themselves libertarians find it differcult to relate with other people, especially on a personal, one to one basis. How we treat people and ourselves is what will make or break any movement with advocates personal and economic liberties for all. Branden should be saluted for his important work in "Biocentric Psychology."

Until the publication of his bestseller, *The Psychology of Self-Esteem* in 1969, Branden was best known for his association with the author of *Atlas Shrugged*, Ayn Rand. With his first book, Branden challenged and rejected the "mainstream" of contemporary psychology, opposing the basic premises of both

psychoanalysis and behaviorism--and launched a new approach to the study of human nature, which he called "Biocentric Psychology." In his two subsequent books, Breaking Free [1970] and The Disowned Self [1971], he developed this approach further.

# Psychology And The Libertarian Mentality

It is becoming more apparent that the approach to liberty is more of a psychological issue than one of politics and economics. Many people refuse to support individual liberty for others and themselves because of the intense fear of being free, the fear of making the wrong choice, and the fear of responsibility for one's actions.

A good example of what the fear of being free can do has been seen in the actions of recent immigrants from the Soviet Union. On a number of occasions, a former Soviet citizen will enter his first American supermarket and shortly have a near nervous break-down on the spot. With so many company brands to choose from, the former Soviet citizen finds it hard to make decisions where he never had to before. In Soviet Russia there is only one brand to choose from. Russian citizens therefore, do not have to make decisions; the State does it for them as a mother would do for her The Soviet citizen looks up to the State for decisions to run his/her life. Any individual who immigrates from a slave nation is faced with the fearful problem of making his own decisons; decisions in which he answers to nobody but himself.

### **Resorting To A Role Change**

Few people, however, confront the issue of liberty from the psychological aspect. It would seem to be reasonable that individuals and groups seeking liberty would discover that liberty is the absence of initiated force or fraud. However, those who are repressed, and who seek the fruits of freedom are psychologically unable to undertand the course that a liberty movement

must take. Instead, those who are repressed seek to rebel against the slavemasters by resorting to a role change. That is, the slave wants to become the master. The freedom of choice is abandon in favor of revenge against the slavemasters. The reason so many revolts against the authorities ultimately end in a role change is because of the psychological fear of allowing people to live peacefully without any oversee. Remember, the former slaves know of no other alternative to life than the old system of ruled and ruler.

The reason this subject is being discussed is because many libertarians are libertarian in economics, history and political science, but fail the test when it comes to psychology. It appears that these libertarians are living a psychological life of either slave or slave-master. For instance, a fairly known libertarian from Southern California injured his girl friend in a domestic fight (putting her in the hospital). Naturally, a very "unlibertarian act." Apparently, this so-called libertarian has taken a slavemaster role in his relationship with others, or at least with women.

### The Unpsychological Libertarian

The "unpsychological libertarian" is caught in some world where he thinks that violence will solve problems. However, this type of libertarian is probably striking back at some unresolved fear in making his own decisions. In personal relationships, the unpsychological libertarian is doing one of two things. First, he is trying to dominate his mate or friend so that there seems to be control, rulership and order in the relationship. Without such control and order, the unpsychological libertarian feels that the result will be chaos, disorder and the his relationship will drift apart, believing that if he does not wear the pants one of two things will occur: she will wear the pants or both will go naked.


Secondly, if the unpsychological libertarian is not the salvemaster, then he acts as the slave. In the case of the slave mentality, the slave expects most decisions to be made by the one who is most dominating. The one with the slave mentality does not want the pain and fear that goes with the responsibility in making one's own decisions. He would rather have someone else take care of him.

Libertarians have a long way to go psychologically. Perhaps this is why so few libertarians are married, or, if they are married, it has been for a very short time and is their second or third marriage (or common-law marriage). Libertarians are very individualistic minded, but this is not necessarily a reason to act like a strongheaded mountain-man in a relationship, or to elude the responsibility to make decisions concerning the course of one's life.

medicine in England?

Since dental care is "free" in England under the National Health Service, one might expect British teeth to be in good condition, right? Guess Again. "One-third of all Britishers over 16 have no natural teeth--it's 44 percent in Scotland. Over half the adults wear dentures (compared with 15 percent in the private-enterprise USA). And 95 percent of the 10-year-olds and 75 of the 5-year-olds in Britain need dental care. What's the problem? The waiting lists are at least six months long at NHS dentists, discouraging all but the most desperate from bothering to obtain dental care. Another triumph for socialism." (Reason, Sept. 1979)

One of the most inspiring meetings of libertarian heavyweights and old-timers occured at the SIL Tenth Anniversary of the Libertarian Movement on Sept. 5 at the Bonaventure Hotel. Now labeled as the "Midnight Banquet" (it lasted well past midnight), the event hosted such greats as Branden, LeFevre, Rothbard and Childs. Karl Hess was to be the surprise keynote speaker, but could not make it. Instead, Hess sent a touching letter which called for a continueous struggle to bring liberty back to America. More than 300 people filled the banquet room.

### **Uncle Sam on Trial**

In an attempt to show the real side of government, the iron glove side of the state, Anthony Hargis and others are working on a short play to put "Uncle Sam On Trial." Suggestions have ranged from a professional 1/2 hour TV situation comedy to a serious drama. The idea of the trial is to put government (Uncle Sam) on trial for simple misconducts like kidnapping, robbery and murder. It is to be a libertarian film and financed by selling shares.
