KARL HESS

Karl Hess, Arthur Laffer and Anton Wilson will be the star speakers at the second Future of Freedom Conference scheduled for April 19 and 20 at Cypress College in Orange County, California (close to Los Angeles).

First started in 1969, this is the oldest libertarian conference series in the world. Every major libertarian author and leader has appeared at these conferences (i.e. Ludwig von Mises, Harry Browne, Dr. Szasz, Poul Anderson, etc.).

This years conference will feature Karl Hess, former speech writer for Sen. Barry Goldwater (1964) and author of *Dear America* and the famous *Playboy* magazine article (1969) entitled *The Death of Politics*. Hess is one of the very early libertarians who turned radical, embracing anarchism and the counter-culture.

Robert Anton Wilson is the author of the *Illuminatus* trilogy, *Cosmic Trigger, Neuropolitics* (with Timothy Leary) and *The Game of Life* (also with Tim Leary). Wilson is a former associated editor of *Playboy* magazine and has a Ph.D. in psychology.

Arthur Laffer is a professor of business economics at USC and has written (and co-authored) four books. He is most noted for his famous economic concept called the "Laffer Curve."

Other speakers include John Matonis, the controversal tax-strike attorney, John Pugsley, author of Common Sense Economics, Neil Schul-Continued on page 2

LIFE JACKETS AND THE LP

Editor: SLL takes no official opinion on the Libertarian Party. The article below is the opinion of the author, and not SLL.

Is the Libertarian Party (LP) necessary, or is it counterproductive to the general libertarian movement? It is

probably both.

The modern libertarian movement began in the mid 1960's, first appearing in California and New York (most notably at Berkeley University). The movement was small, mostly composed of students and professors, and it was clearly anti-political. It was not until 1972 that a more conservative-libertarian group created a political party under the libertarian banner in Colorado. Since 1972, the LP has made spectacular growth in attracting members and money.

The new political party was originally intended as an educational tool only. This, of course, has changed. And the reasons are clear. Most people are conditioned to believe that little can be accomplished outside of a political party. And when an organization advertises as

a political party, it draws in people who are more interested in the art of political maneuvering than in the libertarian philosophy. It's the nature of the beast.

THE QUESTION

The question becomes not whether the LP will develop into a regular dime-a-dozen political party in the future; that is inevitable. The question is whether

we need groups to act as bridges of information.

If the LP accomplishes anything, it surely creates bridges. That is, since most newcomers to libertarianism cannot envision the acquisition of liberty without a formal political party, the LP acts as a bridge to more radical libertarian thought. The LP is like a railroad depot. People from conservative and liberal backgrounds get on at the LP depot and travel towards the many branches of libertarian thought. It is, however, unfortunate that most people use bridges constructed by others, but there is a reason for that.

BRIDGES AND LIFE JACKETS

Generally speaking, people need bridges built by others because, psychologically, they are insecure. People feel that they must grab onto something or perish. The LP, as a formal political structure, helps the newcomer to bridge the gap between a weak, insecure attitude towards liberty and a strong, independent one. The situation is analagous to an individual taking swimming lessons; the learner grips the side of the pool or wears a life jacket to remain afloat. After many lessons, he/she is able to swim independently without outside aid.

The LP best serves the libertarian movement as a life jacket, a bridge to better understanding of liberty. Members of the LP naturally meet and converse with their libertarian cousins (non-political) who stress education (or counter-economics) over politics. It is only a matter of time before LP libertarians begin to acquire a better definition of liberty and how to acquire it for themselves.

Political parties and organizations in general exist only to help people learn to do what they must do for themselves. In essence, this is what liberty is all about--living on your own, freely, confidently and independently. This is similar to what Harry Browne in his bestseller How I Found Freedom In An Unfree World explains--that liberty is something the individual discovers for himself no matter what the political situation is in that particular nation, province, county or city.

Political parties and organizations are only crutches. When a person has reached a certain point of understanding and security, he/she should discard the

crutches and walk unassisted.

The main objective of Libertarian Party leaders should be to eventually say to their members, "Go and disband. There is no further need of political parties. Liberty has been reached. Throw away your crutches. People now live and think for themselves."



For libertarians the worse part of the census is its *involuntary* nature. If a citizen refuses to give the government personal information, a fine of \$100 could be levied. In 1970, only five people were charged with violating the census, and only one person, Bill Danks, was hauled into court and forced to pay the penalty. And his conviction was later overturned.

In 1970, more than 3,000 persons mailed their census forms to the Pennsylvania-based Society for Individual Liberty. This year libertarians expect at least one million persons will mail their census forms to

census protest groups.

Society for Libertarian Life has scheduled a press conference at the Los Angeles Press Club on April 1 at 10:00 am. to shred census forms in protest. Also, a demonstration in front of the L.A. Census headquarters is being considered.

NEW UPDATE ON SLL'S SUIT AGAINST BRIGGS

The SLL lawsuit against Senator John Briggs was to be held on January 15 in the Fullerton Municipal Court. SLL's attorney, David Bergland, was at court as well as three witnesses. However, the courts being so backloged with cases, the Briggs lawsuit was moved to March 13. The trial should not be delayed again since the case is at the top of the judge's list. More details will be given in the next edition.

LIBERTARIANS UNDER ATTACK FROM LIBS-CONS

First it was the left-liberal Commonweal and The Nation that attacked libertarians in the spring of 1979. But the most serious attack on libertarianism has come from the right-conservative National Review last August.

In the National Review attack, Ernest Van den Haag's main attack on libertarianism is its non-interventionist stand towards foreign policy. Libertarians believe that governments should not interfere in people's lives in this country or abroad. This libertarian ideal is very similar to the **Prime Directive** concerning other worlds in the TV series Star Trek.

Unfortunately, Van den Haag and Lawrence V. Cott (who wrote an additional article attacking the Cato Institute) see this non-interventionism as a friendliness toward Marxism. Cott has even written that "Murray Rothbard" (a former writer for National Review and a student of Ludwig von Mises) "is an apologist for Stalin."

It would appear that conservatives are back to their old methods of dealing with something new--just call it *Communist* and hope it will scare people. This is very ironic, since libertarians are on the opposite pole from total government--either communism or facism.

Libertarians alway oppose Marxist governments, not simply because they are communist, but because they are authoritarian. Libertarians oppose authoritarianism, and this is precisely what both conservatives and liberals **do not** oppose. They both utilize their own forms of authoritarianism while opposing other forms--viz. the liberals advocacy of authority to control guns, and the conservative advocacy of authority to control drug use.

Only libertarians remain consistent in opposing coercion in all areas.

CLEVELAND (AP) - "The bite that taxes take out of the paycheck is growing faster than any other economic indicator, including inflation, Industry Week magazine reports in this week's issue.

"Last year total taxes paid increased 13.2 percent while the entire economy, as measured by the gross national product, increased by 12 percent, the business magazine said. Inflation weighed in at only 7.6 percent on the Consumer Price Index.

"In the decade since 1968, total taxes increased 155.3 percent, IW said. In that time, consumer prices rose 87.5 percent.

"The magazine says the big jump has been in state and local taxes, which have risen 187.5 percent since 1968 while federal taxes increased 139.9 percent.

"Americans continue to pay more for taxes than for food, clothing and housing, the magazine said. "In fact, the trend has gotten worse in recent years. Last year, we paid \$624.3 billion in taxes and \$575.1 billion for these three basic necessities.' Oct. 1, 1979

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The Libertas Statement

We, as libertarians, affirm: That full individual liberty is

We, as libertarians, affirm:

That full individual liberty is impossible in any society other than a voluntary one that agresses upon no one;

That men and women require the full and independent use of their own

hat men and women require the full and independent use of their own judgement in order to survive at an optimum level, and therefore have a natural right to do their own Iting, providing that they do not physically harm or coercively restrict another individual's life, liberty or property:

That everyone is exclusively sovereign, and is a slave to no one;
That the individual is best served by society when he or she is free from the forcefully imposed controls of others, acting alone or in concert (as a

government):
That all forms of coercion, aggression and fraud are always immoral:
That the only system consistent with personal freedoms in the economic areas is one that does not interfere with free trade between consenting individuals.

THEREFORE, we, as libertarians, resolve to oppose all forms of aggression by any State, Government, self-appointed savior, individual, or association of individuals. We further resolve to oppose taxation, conscription, eminent domain, laws which create victimless "crimes," and all programs forced onto individuals without their consent. It is time that the chains of authoritarianism in economics and morality be broken. Individual rights and coercion cannot coe-exist. Liberty cannot be compromised, and we will settle for no less than freedom in our time.
